

To the King's most excellent majesty

The humble petition of Mungo Vinton of Gokermouth
in the County of Cumberland.

Most humble sheweth that whereas your said subject together with William
Wickliffe esq^r and W^m Stordale, beinge travellinge in the place called gylstane
in the County of Cumberland, upon the afternoon of the right honorable
Earle of Northumberland, were besett upon by a compaigne of insolent, wicked
and barbarous ^{people} men, who not content with the same great spoyle of horses money
and apparell, to the value of 200^l and upwards, which they took from your said
subjects, but did carry away the said W^m Wickliffe and Mungo Vinton prisoners
into Scotland and were most barbarously intreated, and dooynge refused to the
contentment of your said subjects estate their wives and children and the said W^m
Stordale also spoiled of all he had, to the value of 100^l more, but released
of imprisonment.

Since which tyme your said subject accordinge to due course of law, hath
prosecuted the same matter, at the Court of Chancery, and there indicted some of
the said offenders, beinge then in gaole, yett hath no punishment bene inflicted upon
them, nor your subject recompensed,

Most humble beseecheth that your highnes warrant and speciall command may be
directed to your highnes commission^{ers} in these parts for the apprehension of the
said offenders, and also for one of the most principall of them Geoffrey Corleken
also exco^m for person, now remaininge about London, whereby your highnes your
subject may receive lawe redress of the said offenders, for his extreme losse or
the lawe to be executed ^{upon} against them, accordinge to your demerits and your good
subject as in all duties he is bound, shall daily praye to god for the preservation
of your ^{and your} ^{royall} ^{regne} ^{and} ^{long} ^{to} ^{reigne} ^{and} ^{so}.

The King's majesty is pleased that the lord of the
