of this county, inclosed in a letter from my lord
Clifford, who in pursuit of the contents of this
letter he hath appointed a General muster, for all
the traine soldiers horse, and foot upon the 13th
of October next, And because M^{rs} hath been
the usual place, and as is conceived the most
convenient for the Countie, we have observed
of yo^r lord made bold to subscrite you honor happy
baron thereof, for bearing to people of any hills
we know yo^r lord's pleasure therein, in respect
of shortness of time we desire withall speed, And
so with tender of our humble service was take out
leave.
